

## POLICING IN NORTH HERTS

Crime in North Herts fell by 14.9% between January and December 2009, significantly more than any other district in Hertfordshire - reinforcing the fact that residents and businesses are less likely to fall victim to crime than almost any other place in the county. Challenges during 2010-2011 will include maintaining those reductions whilst continuing to address crimes of burglary against local businesses, garages and sheds - which have shown an upward trend over the last two years.

- Police in North Herts have improved the resilience of rural communities through numerous partnership operations using Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) technology. A Rural Intelligence Gathering System (RIGS) will be introduced in 2010-2011 to reduce the time it takes to distribute intelligence among key stakeholders. Six new specialist rural Special Constables have been trained to handle this system to maximise visibility across rural areas.
- Partnership work alongside town centre management, rangers, the North Herts Crime Prevention Panel, retailers and Pubwatches continues to make the day and night-time economies safer, while test-purchase operations are conducted at licensed premises. Awareness campaigns such as 'Be Safe' and 'Know Your Limits' have been implemented, together with targeted shoplifting patrols to improve safety and reduce crime in town centres.
- Dispersal Orders have been introduced to prevent and maintain the low levels of anti-social behaviour in and around Letchworth Garden City and Hitchin town centres. Initial evaluation indicates a positive impact with incident levels and crimes falling by as much as 38%.
- The vast majority of children and young people in the District continue to behave responsibly. However, at locations with higher perceived levels of anti-social behaviour amongst youths, multi-agency arrangements have been made to provide sports, dance and other engagement opportunities. Combined with tailored health and wellbeing advice, the 'Tackling Anti-Social Behaviour' and 'Summer Youthoria' programmes have provided positive experiences for the younger generation whilst reducing reports of anti-social behaviour.

# THE COST OF POLICING HERTFORDSHIRE

*You said, we listened, we did...*

Hertfordshire Constabulary is one of the top performing forces in the country and consistently delivers results - a 20% drop in crime in the last five years and detections at an all-time high.

The Authority gets about 60% of its funding from Government grants but Hertfordshire has missed out in recent years. The formula used to allocate the money shows we should receive more but, this coming year alone, Government is withholding £4.1m of the grants due. This leaves a shortfall against the amount we need to maintain our high standard of policing.

To fill this gap, and to minimise Council Tax increases, we have previously used money from our reserves. However, these are now at a lower level and the amount we can draw from them is limited. We now face unprecedented financial pressures. The public have told us they want us to maintain and improve police services but this could only be achieved by a substantial increase in Council Tax – not something the Authority felt was reasonable, given the wider financial climate.

We have, therefore, increased Council Tax by 3.5% (just under 10p a week), which means someone living in a Band D property will pay £147.82 (£2.84 a week). This is well below the national average for shire forces. Our Net Budget will be £190.8m, a rise of £5.9m, with nationally agreed pay increases accounting for more than two-thirds of that. We will have 3,951 officers and staff - about 100 fewer than currently. The highest ever level of savings will be made to balance the budget and enable £0.9m investment in priority areas such as neighbourhood policing and responding to anti-social behaviour and serious and organised crime.

## Giving you value for money

We pride ourselves on providing good value for money – something recognised nationally in recent independent inspections.

To do that the Authority sets demanding efficiency targets that either deliver the same or higher levels of service for less money or more or better services for the same cost. Those targets are consistently exceeded, with an estimated £14.5m savings achieved over the two years up to 31 March 2010, including £8.7m in 2008/09. This is the equivalent to £33 per Band D property (national average £54).

We are now well on course to achieving our 2008/11 target of over £20m, which is in line with the same high level of savings achieved in the previous three years.

The largest single concern you have raised with us over the past year has been rowdy and anti-social behaviour – it's what most calls to the police are about and one of the most common concerns brought up at public meetings and in surveys.

In response, the Authority has tasked the Constabulary to place an even greater emphasis on tackling the local concerns that affect your everyday lives, in particular, anti-social behaviour and anti-social, and often dangerous, motoring.

To deliver this, we have pledged our on-going support for more visible and accessible policing and, despite significant funding reductions, have committed substantial resources to ensure our Neighbourhood Policing Teams remain at the heart of policing in the county.

At the same time, we recognise the need to maintain our covert capability to tackle serious and organised crime. These crimes can take extensive resources and time to bring offenders to justice. You may not be aware of them at a local level but crimes such as drug trafficking can impact on burglary, theft and robbery, as criminals try to fund their illegal drug habits.
